

The Honorable Hastings Gantt: 50 Acres & A School

Hastings Gantt, shown here near Penn School in 1907, was born near Edisto Island, South Carolina in approximately 1830 to Hannah and Joe Gantt. In 1862, during The Civil War, Union troops retook possession of the area around Port Royal Sound and surrounding Sea Islands. As a result, thousands of enslaved people, including Gantt, became free.

By 1864, Gantt had met Penn School founders Laura Towne and Ellen Murray. By 1866, Gantt was a landowner and civic leader on Saint Helena Island, including being an Advisory Committee Member to the Beaufort branch of the Freedmen's Savings Bank. In 1870, he was elected as a Representative of Beaufort County to the South Carolina General Assembly, and he served multiple terms until 1883.

Gantt's life was interwoven with the story and success of the Penn School. By 1902, and until his death around 1910, Gantt sold and possibly donated land so that the Penn School, now known as the Penn Center, could expand its campus and secure its future.

To Major General O. O. Howard,

Commissioner of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands:

We, the Loyal People of the State of South Carolina, do earnestly but respectfully remonstrate with you, as the recognized agent of the Government, against the proposed restoration of the Island Lands of this State to the original owners, as an act which will stand in open and flagrant violation of the plighted faith of the United States Government, as declared in certain acts of Congress approved July 2d, 1862, and March 3d, 1865, and referred to in General Orders No. 9, issued by yourself, and in words following, to wit: "The pardon of the President will not be understood to extend to the surrender of abandoned or confiscated property which by law has been 'set apart for Refugees and Freedmen,' or in use for the 'employment and general welfare of all persons within the lines of National Military occupation within said Insurrectionary States, formerly held as slaves, who are or shall become free."

We therefore solemnly protest against the proposed restoration of said Lands as, under existing circumstances, an act of governmental injustice which would stand without a parallel in the annals or civilized nations—an act also which must bring unspeakable suffering and woe upon thousands who will thus be cruelly disappointed in their hopes, thrust out of their homes in poverty, and made dependent upon the cold charity of those, mainly, through whose oppression and blind infatuation in the past, we owe our present unhappy condition; and we earnestly pray that you will stay your hand, and refuse to carry into execution a measure so manifestly cruel and injudicious, if not even dangerous.

On a petition to Major General O. O. Howard, Hastings Gantt is a signatory protesting President Andrew Johnson's Circular #13 which would have allowed the return of land ownership to the Confederate rebels.

INDEX TO DEEDS, BEAUFORT COUNTY, S. C.—CROSS

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Quit Claim Deed (QCD) transferring 68 acres of land from Edward S. Philbrick to Hastings Grant [sic], actually believed to be Hastings Gantt, on Saint Helena Island where Penn School is situated.

1868

VILLAGE, St. HELENA, January 10, 1868.

My splendid Christmas box is reminding me daily of your kindness, one and all. The butter is delicious. I never tasted any so good. The crackers, prunes, preserves, all come in at odd times with a marvellously cheering effect. The thick carriage rug "laps us warm" every day, and is so beautiful that I don't look out of the carriage any more, but keep my eyes on it.

General Gile came up here a day or so ago, and he is now going at once to put up the Frogmore school-house. I am to deed the two acres to trustees, of whom I am to be one, Hastings the other, and Columbus the third. It is to be a substantial building, and large enough, I hope, for a large school.

The planters all intend to give up, and let their places lie idle this year rather than lose as they did last year — or they say so, possibly with a view to having money or rations advanced to them from Government, a most foolish and destructive plan if the Government consents.



metamorphosis from slave to economic man and the resultant preoccupation with money-making both surprised and offended the spiritual sensibilities of one A.M.A. missionary. "In temporal things, the colored people of these islands, are mainly doing well. I do not think it would be for their good, at the present time, to increcis their facilities for getting money. Most of them have ample means for gaining property fast, by their industry & shrewdness: they have become owners of land to a considerable extent, & are raizing cotton, as they say for 'old nigger himself,' & not for 'massa.'" 20

Hastings Gantt, a plantation slave and later a representative from Beaufort for the better part of the decade, was evidently one of this group of newly freed entrepreneurs. By 1870 he had acquired a farm of eighty-four arable acres worth \$900. He owned three milk cows valued at \$100, from which he marketed 100 pounds of butter and 200 gallons of milk. Gantt raised 100 bushels of Indian corn, 650 pounds of rice, 75 bushels of sweet potatoes, and ten bushels of beans, in addition to his staple crop of five bales of cotton.²¹ In 1871 Gantt's success won him election as president of the St. Helena Planter's Society.

Many other ex-slave legislators could boast of similar achievements in the immediate postwar period, but, unlike Gantt, most of them had origins in the same class of slaves that had produced the earlier free Negro class: that is, artisans and domestics. Some of the leading figures in the General Assembly—William Beverly Nash, Prince Rivers, Robert Smalls, William R. Jervay—had been employed as house servants or artisans while in slavery. When the war broke out, two of them were in the process of buying freedom for themselves or their families, and

STATUTES AT LARGE

No. 444.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE PLANTERS' REPUBLICAN SOCIETY OF ST. HELENA ISLAND, BEAUFORT COUNTY.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That Hastings Gantt, Joseph Bird, Toby Bias, Plato Fields, Moses Brown, Harry Jenkins, Toby Brown, Benjamin Day, and their associates and successors, be, and they are hereby, constituted a body corporate and

Corporate politic, under the name of "The Planters' Republican Society, of St. Helena Island, Beaufort County," with the right to hold and own property not exceeding in value the sum of ten thousand dollars, with the right to sue and be sued, to plead and be impleaded, in any Court of competent jurisdiction; to have and use a common seal, and the same to alter at will and pleasure, with the right also to make such by-laws for the government of the said corporation not inconsistent with the laws of the land.

SEC. 2. This Act shall be deemed a public Act, and shall remain Made a pubin force until repealed.

Approved February 12, 1874.

No. 445. AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE BEAUFORT COUNTY AGRICUL-TURAL AND MECHANICAL ASSOCIATION.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Represen. tatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That Robert Smalls, P. L. Wiggins, Samuel Green, W. Kressel, F. W. Sheper, S. W. Wallace, J. B. Bascomb, J. H. Ruddell, C. J. Colcock, R. L. Bostick, E. J. Ravenah, J. W. Collins, William Fields, R. F. As Representative, Gantt was involved in setting up societies and associations for St. Helena, including The Planter's Republican Society and The Beaufort County Agricultural and Mechanical Association.

In 1902, Gantt sold 68.1 acres to Penn for \$755.60. His wife Celia was present as a witness. Gantt retained 10 acres on which to live and farm. In 1905, Gantt arranged for his remaining 10 acres to transfer to the Penn School upon his death.
